



Millennium Gate Fact Sheet

Project Description: The Millennium Gate is an expression of world class architecture and sculpture, as well as a generous gift to the citizens of Atlanta from the National Monument Foundation. Located at the center of the Atlantic Station® community, the \$18 million arch will celebrate human peace and prosperity, with special attention paid to Georgia's rich history and people.

Construction Schedule: Construction began in 2005 with the arrival of the "Peace" and "Justice" statues; completion is expected in 2006.

Creator: The Millennium Gate arch was conceptualized by the National Monument Foundation. Its President, Rodney Cook Jr., a lifelong Atlanta resident whose family tree includes two city mayors, already raised two-thirds of the funding to complete the work.

Contributors: Contributors include Invesco, the Lane Company and members of the Rollins family, founders of the Orkin exterminator company. The Atlantic Station redevelopment donated an acre of land valued at \$1.37 million for the monument.

Architect of Record: Collins Cooper Carusi Architects

Landscape Design: Tunnell and Tunnell, Landscape Architecture

Museum Designer: Edwin Schlossberg

Project Sculptor: Alexander Stoddart of Scotland, who recently completed the monumental Queens Gallery at Buckingham Palace.

Millennium Gate Facts: The Millennium Gate will be nationally significant, yet historically respective to the City of Atlanta.

The Gate will anchor the eastern end of the Atlantic Station community's Commons Park and will be located between residential and commercial elements of the Atlantic Station community. At 73 feet tall, Millennium Gate will be the largest public monument to be built since the Jefferson Memorial.



The project is comparable to Washington Arch in New York, the Wellington Arch in London, the Carrousel Arch in Paris and the Siegestor Arch in Munich.

- Two smaller sculptures will be set on each side of the Gate.
- The structure will contain history exhibits and an art gallery and will be open to the public.
- The rooftop will be available for weddings and other events.
- The history exhibits within the arch will recreate the office of Thomas Glenn, the late chairman of Trust Company bank, who in the 1930s ran Atlantic Steel, the mill site now being converted to the Atlantic Station community. Glenn's family is among the project's supporters.

Community:

Co-developed by AIG Global Real Estate Investment Corp., a member company of American International Group Inc. (AIG) and Jacoby Development Inc, the Atlantic Station redevelopment is a 138-acre environmental redevelopment of the former Atlantic Steel Mill at the nexus of interstates 75 and 85 in Midtown Atlanta. The redevelopment is ultimately projected to include 15 million square feet of retail, office, residential and hotel space as well as 11 acres of public parks.
